As we relocate Dillingham Donor Center and BBH headquarters, we are taking this as an opportunity to improve for you.

"New Getting Newer" renovation project update

Young Street Donor Center (YSDC) renovation is well underway. The bulk of the first phase, completed on schedule at the end of September, was the reconfiguration of the interior including the expansion of the donor floor and canteen.

The expanded collections center features a bright open design to accommodate up to 14 beds, initially four for apheresis and six for whole blood. We took advantage of the new floor space by setting up the beds for donors to engage in conversation, plug in and get online, or simply relax. The choice is yours. The spacious canteen area

mirrors the same multipurpose intention with table and counter seating, depending on your preference, along with wi-fi and charging stations.

The second phase of YSDC improvements is in progress. Still to come is a signature art wall to welcome you as you enter the donation area. Also in the works is the new donor recognition program. Stay tuned for more details in December as that project advances.

Expect to see changes outside as well. The exterior of the building is undergoing a transformation to make the center easier to find and recognize. We want our Moiliili neighbors to know what great things are happening in their backyard. When you walk or drive into the parking lot, people will know you are there to save lives. Improved lighting and a more welcoming entrance will be a bright start to your donation experience.

When one door closes, another opens.

January 5, 2016 is the planned date to celebrate the completion of the YSDC renovation project and the opening of the doors to apheresis collections. Monday, January 4th will be the last day for blood collections at Dillingham Donor Center (DDC).

Holiday shopping is tough. Donating blood is easy.



Counting on Platelets

Four months ago, Kevin Schmidt brought his wife, Casey to the ER. A recent low blood cell count had her scheduled for a follow-up doctor's visit but she was feeling so tired and weak. Her fingernails were stark white and she had a rapid heart rate. Kevin knew something was seriously wrong.

At the ER, they were shocked to discover Casey had one third the amount of blood a person needs to live. Her life-threatening condition made it impossible for her heart to pump enough blood through her body. She was at a high risk for organ failure. Saline intravenous therapy and blood transfusions saved her life that day; but nothing could have prepared them for the next diagnosis. Casey had leukemia.

Having a blood cancer meant her body was struggling to produce blood. Although aggressive chemotherapy could fight the cancer, both the leukemia and the treatment decreased her blood cell counts. That's when Kevin realized her desperate need for platelets. "Before this, I didn't even know what platelets were," he said with a shrug. "Now, I know how important they are. She needs platelets to keep her alive," he added.

Casey thinks back to when she would hear the call for blood donors on the radio. "I used to think, if I had the time I would stop and donate," she recalls. "Now I need it for my own survival. Once I was waiting during a crucial time in my treatment when my blood counts were low and no platelets were readily available. It made me realize how essential platelet donors are."

"She counts on platelets being there. I count on it. Our nine children, we all count on people we've never met to give," Kevin added. High school sweethearts, they recently celebrated their 20th anniversary in the hospital. Their family is close and Casey can't wait to get back home and see all her children, including her youngest, one-year-old Delilah.

"It's not just red blood cells and platelets; it's the life blood donors have given me. My leukemia is a whole family experience. It's a scary time for us because we don't know what to expect. Which is why I'm so thankful; thanks to blood donors I have more time with my children and my husband."

The news of DDC's blood collections relocating was announced at the recent annual high school workshop. lolani School sponsored our first high school advisory meeting on Oct. 15th. They are also one of five schools who have increased their number of drives per school year. Other schools have collected more blood than ever. This summer, Kailua high school's Surfriders surpassed their blood drive record, spurring Kalaheo high school's competitive spirit. Kalaheo's most recent blood drive came in 20 pints over their goal. Also Farrington High School will host a blood drive after a two-year hiatus.


Where everybody knows your name
